They self-study the study regulations. In cooperation with the study advisor, they arrange meetings with new students at the beginning of the academic year.

They inform the new students about life at the university, their rights and responsibilities, and explain the principles of credit study. They advise students on the selection of courses and creation of study plans in AiS2. They share their own experience with the selection and acquisition of study literature, studying for exams, individual study possibilities, scholarships, and participating in student organisations. They identify, analyse, and evaluate the tutored students' needs (e.g. via an online survey). In cooperation with the department study advisor and other student tutors, they prepare informational presentations and discussions, and promotes them. They inform other students on important dates in the academic schedule. They collect complaints and ideas, evaluate, and communicate study related issues to the relevant employees. They communicate via an appropriate social media platform as well.
